

HE OLELO KUIKAKI.

1831

ARTICLES of arrangement made and concluded at Oahu, between THOMAS AP CATESBY JONES, appointed by the United States, of the one part, and KAUIKEOUKI, King of the Sandwich Islands, and his Guardians, on the other part.

ARTICLE I.

The peace and friendship subsisting between the United States and their Majesties, the Queen Regent and Kauikeouki, King of the Sandwich Islands, and their subjects and people, are hereby confirmed and declared to be perpetual.

ARTICLE II.

The ships and vessels of the United States (as well as their Consuls and all other citizens,) within the territorial jurisdiction of the Sandwich Islands, together with all their property, shall be inviolably protected against all enemies of the United States in time of war.

ARTICLE III.

The contracting parties, being desirous to avail themselves of the bounties of Divine Providence, by promoting the commercial intercourse and friendship subsisting between the respective nations; for the better security of these desirable objects, their Majesties bind themselves to receive into their ports and harbours all ships and vessels of the United States, and to protect to the uttermost of their capacity, all such ships and vessels, their cargoes, officers and crews, so long as they shall behave themselves peacefully, and not infringe the established laws of the land; the citizens of the United States being permitted to trade freely with the people of the Sandwich Islands.

ARTICLE IV.

Their Majesties do further agree to extend the fullest protection within their control to all ships and vessels of the United States, which may be wrecked on their shores, and to render every assistance in their power to save the wreck and her apparel and cargo; and as a reward for the assistance and protection which the people of the Sandwich Islands shall afford to all such distressed vessels of the United States, they shall be entitled to salvage or a portion of the property so saved; but such salvage shall in no case exceed one third of the value saved, which valuation is to be fixed by a commission of disinterested persons, who shall be chosen equally by the parties.

ARTICLE V.

Citizens of the United States whether resident or transient, engaged in commerce or trading to the Sandwich Islands, shall be inviolably protected in their lawful pursuits; and shall be allowed to sue for and recover by judgement, all claims against the subjects of his Majesty, the King, according to strict principles of equity and the acknowledged practice of civilized nations.

ARTICLE VI.

Their Majesties do further agree, and bind themselves, to discountenance and use all practicable means to prevent desertion from all American ships which visit the Sandwich Islands; and to that end, it shall be made the duty of all governors, magistrates, chiefs of districts and all others in authority, to apprehend all deserters, and deliver them over to the master of the vessel from which they have deserted; and for the apprehension of every such deserter, who shall be delivered over as aforesaid, the master, owner or agent shall pay to the person or persons apprehending such deserter, the sum of six dollars, if taken on the side of the island near which the vessel is anchored; but if taken on the opposite side of the island, the sum shall be twelve dollars; and if taken on any other island, the reward shall be twenty-four dollars, and shall be a just charge against the wages of every such deserter.

ARTICLE VII.

No tonnage dues or impost shall be exacted of any citizen of the United States, which is not paid by the citizens or subjects of the nation most favoured in commerce with the Sandwich Islands; and the citizens or subjects of the Sandwich Islands shall be allowed to trade with the United States and her Territories, upon principles of equal advantage with the most favoured nation.

Done in Council at Honolulu, Island of Oahu, this 23 day of December, in the year of our Lord 1826.

Na'olelo keia i hooponoponoia'i a i hoopaaia'i i Oahu nei e THOMAS AP CATESBY JONES kekahi, ko Amerika luna i hoouniai mai nei mai ka United States mai, a me ke ali'i o ko Hawaii nei pae aina o KAUIKEOUKI o laua me ona kabu kekahi.

PAUKU 1.

Eia kekahi olelo; ke olelo pu nei kakou e hooponoponoia'i i Oahu nei e THOMAS AP CATESBY JONES kekahi, ko Amerika a me ko Hawaii lulu ali'i wahine a me ke ali'i nui o Hawaii nei o KAUIKEOUKI, a me ko laua poc kanaka a me na mukaeinana a pau loa; eia ka hoatlona o mau loa'u ua kuikahi nei.

PAUKU 2.

Eia hou neia, a o ko Amerika poc moku mai a mo ko laula Kauikole, a me ko laula kanaka na keia pae aina a me ko laukou waiwai, a i hiki i ka wa kaua, e pau ia mai mea i ka malama pono in e ko Hawaii nei i ko Amerika encini a pau loa.

PAUKU 3.

Eia hou neia, e malemameka ana keia mai poc e loa mai ia lakou ka waiwai a ke Atua i hawaii mai ai, i ka hookawai pu ana me ke aloha po ana o na aina o ka poc nana keia olelo, no laula boi no ka paa pono ana o keia man mea inahalo, e no mai ua mau ali'i o Hawaii nei, e pono in laua e komo no iloko o ko laua awa a me ko laua mau wahi e ku ai la moku, o na'moku Amerika a pau, a e malama nui oku i ua mau moku la a me na ukana maluna a me na ali'i a me na kanaka o na mau moku la o'i hana pono mai lakou a i huki ole ia lakou na kanawai o kela aina i kau ai, e knai no hoi ko Amerika, me ko Hawaii nei poc kanaka.

PAUKU 4.

Eia hou neia; ke olelo io nei ua mau ali'i nei, e malama nui laua i ko Amerika poc moku ke ili mai ma ko laua pae aina, e hookaika ponoaku laua i pakete ai ka moku ili a me kana mau mea a pau a me kona ukana. He pono no e loa mai i ko Hawaii nei poc ka uku no ko lakou hookaika ana i pakete ai ua moku ili la a i malama pono in ai ka mau mea ana.—Eia ka uku, he mau kala paha, a i ole in, o kekahi pau o ka waiwai i hoopakelie in ai, ku uku. Ioa ekolu puu waiwai ua like, hookahi puu paha ka uku, ala aole loa e nui aku lo lakou uku i kekahi o ua pun waiwai atekolu la.

A o ka mea nona ka moku a o ka poc i hoopakelie ai ka waiwai, e kuhikuli puu lakou i kekahi mau kannan e aole no lakou ka waiwai na lakou hoi e hoike mai i ka nui o ka waiwai i malamaia ai.

PAUKU 5.

A o ko Amerika poc kanaka o kuai ana ma ko Hawaii nei pae aina, ka poc e noho ana a me ka poc e holoholo ana, e pau lakou i ka malama ponoia i ka lakou hana ana i ka mea i ku i ka kanawai.

A he pono no lakou o hoopaa i ka poc lawehala ma ke kanawai, a ma ka ahaoeleo e loa mai ai ia lakou ka uku e pau ai ka aile pono a pau a na kanaka o ko Hawaii nei ali'i e like ai me ke kanawai pololei a me ka oihana o ka aina naauao i ikeai ai.

PAUKU 6.

Eia hou neia, ke olelo io nei ke ali'i nui laua o leona kahu ka olelo i pau ai laua i ka hookaika alu laua e pau ai ka mahuka ana mai o na kanaka o ko Amerika mau moku e hiki mai ana i ko Hawaii nei pae aina, e alai aku no i ka mahuka ana mai.

No ia mea, he pono no na'lili malama nina, a me na kilo, a me na kiaaina, a me na kauaii a pau o hopu alu a pau ka poc mahuka a pau, a e hoikoi akin i ka mea nona ka moku i haolele in aku ai.

A o ukua mai ko onei poc i hopu alu, o ka mea nona ka moku. Ina ma ka aoao o ka aina e ku ai ka moku e pau ai ka mea i mahuka, eono kala ka uku. A ina ma keia aoao o ka aina e pau ai umi a me-kumamahu kala ka uku, a ina ma ka aina e i moku i ke kai e pau ai a i hoihoi i kona moku, iwakalua kala a me kumamahu ka uku no loko pono keia uku o ka waiwai a ka mea mahuka i hoolimalima'i, maluia e kau ponoia'i.

PAUKU 7.

Eia hou neia; aole oi aka ka uku mai no ke awa o ko Amerika poc kanaka i ko ka aina punalele kanaka, e kai ana ma ko Hawaii pae aina, ailo kii hoo'ia aka ka uku nui no o ko Amerika kanaka.

A o kai no ko Hawaii nei poc kanaka me ko Amerika, e like ka oihana a me ka pono e pono ai ko ka aina-punahoa ion i ke kai pu ana mai no ko Hawaii nei pae aina.
